Course description:	This course will help increase the students' awareness of major areas of linguistics, its universality, diversity, complexity as well as its social significance. The course introduces students to the field of linguistics, by exposing them to its core subdisciplines: phonetics (the study of sounds and their production), phonology (the psychological representation and pattern of sounds), morphology (the structure of words), syntax (the structure of sentences), semantics (the meaning), and pragmatics (the use in context). Additional topics to be addressed include first language acquisition and second language acquisition that provide the main language learning concepts and theories covered by applied linguistics, and brain and language as a topic that explains how language is processed in the brain.	
Course objectives:	<ul> <li>This course aims to provide:</li> <li>an up-to-date introduction to the study of linguistics, the discipline that investigates the acquisition, production, and comprehension of language;</li> <li>an awareness of the language phenomenon, through themes such as, the relations between language and the brain, the process of producing sounds, words, syntactic structure, and meaning;</li> <li>an analysis of the pragmatic outcomes of language;</li> <li>an introduction of the social and cultural effects on communication;</li> <li>a definition and elaboration of first and second language acquisition.</li> </ul>
